# A Matter of Principles

There are seven cooperative principles that give all co-ops guidance. Cooperatives around the world operate according to the same set of core principles and values, adopted by the International Cooperative Alliance (ICA). Cooperatives trace the roots of these principles to the first modern cooperative founded in Rochdale, England in 1844.

Wheatland Electric Cooperative Inc., was formed in 1948 based on the cooperative business model, with the foundation of these seven cooperative principles:

- ▶ 1. Voluntary and Open Membership
- ▶ 2. Democratic Member Control
- ▶ 3. Members' Economic Participation
- ▶ 4. Autonomy and Independence
- ▶ 5. Education, Training and Information
- ▶ 6. Cooperation among Cooperatives
- ▶ 7. Concern for Community

Stephen Covey, the late author of *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*, once said, "We should begin with the end in mind." This is another way of answering the question: What are we trying to accomplish? With that advice in mind, we

begin with focusing on Principle 7: Concern for Community.

Concern for the community is the reason why Wheatland Electric was founded. The people in our parents', grandparents' or great grandparents' generation came together using the cooperative business model as their guide. It was their concern for our community—to bring safe, reliable and competitively priced electric power to our region—that defined our purpose.

The ICA provides the following explanation for Principle 7: While focusing on member needs, cooperatives work for the sustainable development of communities through policies and programs accepted by the members.

It is in that spirit of meeting the needs of our communities that Wheatland Electric offers wholesale water and broadband internet services. In addition to providing electric service, Wheatland Electric gives back to the communities we serve through programs such as Youth Tour, school safety programs, and Relay for Life.

For cooperatives, these are easy decisions to make because unlike investor-owned businesses where the owners and employees can be far removed from the users of the services, at Wheatland Electric

In addition to our local service offices, members will be able to make donations at the City Hall in Caldwell and Hired Man Grocery in Conway Springs. All donations will be made to the local food bank in the community that the item was donated in. Help us "Cram the Van."

Since Wheatland was first formed in 1948, our primary concern has been for the communities we serve. Going forward, we will continue to work for the sustainable development of all the communities we serve. We welcome your input as we work to meet your needs for the future.

## Rebates Available to Upgrade Your HVAC

Did you know that Wheatland offers rebates to residential members for the installation of energy-efficient heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) systems?

Heating and cooling a house often accounts for the majority of a household's monthly energy costs. Many homeowners have a great opportunity to save energy and money by installing a more efficient HVAC system.

Essentially, higher efficiency equates to lower monthly energy bills and improved comfort. For

example, you could receive a \$410 rebate for a four-ton (48,000 BTU) heat pump.
